19 – 29 October "Common Ground" – Art exhibition by Robin Gray & Cerys Jones

Wedmore artist, Robin Gray is joining Garstang, Lancashire artist Ceris Jones for an exhibition at the museum. Both artists are well known and locally popular for their pictures relating to caving and cave exploration and are both members of ISSA, The International Society for Spelaeological Art.

However, in this exhibition they will share the common ground of landscapes and high mountains, still life both set up and found, life drawing, and abstract art. Both artists have spent many years teaching and have combined being teachers with working as professional artists. (Robin was Director of Art and Drama at Shapwick School and currently acts as tutor to the Draycott Art Club) This exhibition will show paintings, drawings, and prints. Works will be both framed and as mounted work in the browsers. They will be at the museum to talk to visitors on aspects of the exhibition which they both enjoy immensely. **Free entry to exhibition only.**

23 November – 3 December Mixed media exhibition by Michael Brobson

27 September – 17 December "Making the Mural" – A photographic exhibition

As part of the museum's Search & Learn project, supported by a grant from the National Lottery Heritage Fund, this exhibition will feature photographs taken by Ann Cook showing the processes involved in creating our wonderful new ceramic mural.

The mural depicts three characters who significantly contributed to the wellbeing of the city's residents, Bishop Beckynton who constructed a conduit to supply the city with fresh water, Dean William Turner 'the father of English botany' who's Herbal was the first to be written in English, and the founder of the museum caver Herbert Balch.

It was unveiled on Saturday 24 September by the

contemporary representatives of these three, Rt Reverend Ruth Worsley Bishop of Taunton, the Very Revd Dr John Davies Dean of Wells, and locally based caver Chris Jewell who was involved in the rescue of members of a junior football team from the flooded Tham Luang cave in Thailand.

Search & Learn report

Capital Works

Following a consultation session for internal and external stakeholders held on 14 July, consultants Far Post Design have continued to develop the concept design for the two galleries, Balch Study and ground floor lobby area.

Project Team

Recruitment of a Collections Manager, who will digitise the Phillips Collection of glass plate negatives and support the Curator with tasks associated with development of the new gallery spaces, took place in July. Matt Williams joined the team on 6 September. He is based in Wells and will work for the museum 1 day a week while continuing his role as Collections Manager at the Bath Royal Literary and Scientific Institution 4 days a week

The first Search & Learn Steering Group meeting was held on 6 September. This was an opportunity for museum staff and volunteers to meet with project partners and contractors in order to review progress and discuss next steps.

Activities



Museum mentor training for volunteers was held on 23 September. We have delivered three family activities in partnership with Somerset Art Works: on 13 August sculptor Fiona Campbell led a workshop inspired by the museum's swan, and on 25 August textile artist Jan Ollis led a collaborative recreation of one of the samplers on display within the museum. On 24 September artist and filmmaker Sean Harris led an animation workshop inspired by the palaeontology on display in the Balch Room. The next workshop will be held on 28 October. Library News

It is hoped that the final processes will be completed during October, depending on when the Librarian has recovered sufficiently from a fractured hip to be able to navigate the Museum stairs.

Friday 7 October at 7.30pm – "Astronomy before the telescope" Martin Lunn MBE will be joining us remotely from his home in Yorkshire. Known as the Rambling Astronomer, Martin is an acclaimed astronomy speaker and educator. He says of his talk: 'We are used to hearing of fantastic discoveries made by astronomers using powerful telescopes. However, astronomers around the world were studying the night sky for thousands of years before telescopes were invented. Using very simple equipment they made many fantastic discoveries, and some things they got very wrong. This is their story.
