### 14 – 23 June Artwork by Martin Bentham RWA

Martin's paintings mainly evolve from the landscape of the Mendip Hills, it's people and their work, but not always. He won 'First Prize' at the Royal Bath & West Show in 2007. The 'Daler-Rowney Oil Painting prize' in the 155th Annual Autumn Exhibition and First and Second Prize in the 'Viewers Choice Award' at the 156th Autumn Exhibition, both at the



Royal West of England Academy in Bristol. He was elected as an Academician at RWA in 2009. As well as having had successful exhibitions dating from 1993, Bentham had two shows at the RWA in 2010 and 2012. More recently, in 2014 and 2018, he had two shows at The Bishop's Palace in Wells.

## The Pageant of 1923: "A Celebration of Community"

The first half of the twentieth century saw a flowering of historical pageants in England, starting with a re-enactment of the history of Sherborne, Dorset in 1905. Pageants provide opportunities for communities to act out the history and folklore associated with their local area, and the tradition lives on in the West Country today: Axbridge Pageant was last held in 2022 and plans are already underway for 2030.



The Wells Pageant took place 100 years ago in July 1923, and the Museum's founder and first curator Herbert Balch played a key role in planning and scripting the event. It was documented by local photographer Bert Phillips, who captured portraits of those who took part, as well as scenes from the Pageant itself. A selection of these will be on display alongside some of the very few objects associated with the Pageant which survive in the Museum's collections.

We are grateful to Jordan Cole of Bath Spa University who has guest-curated this exhibition with support from Museum Trustee Clare Blackmore, and to D H James Ltd and Somerset

## 7 – 24 June - An Exhibition of Photographic Art

"Essence of Wells" by Rose Atkinson - Rose is a photographic artist from



Wells who uses her camera freely, much like an artist uses a paintbrush to express what her senses feel in the moment of seeing. Elements of light and shade, colour, line and form, inspire images which are more expressionist than representational. Painterly impressions blur the lines between photography and the artist's canvas. In 2022 Rose was awarded an Associateship in Visual Art Photography by the Royal Photographic Society for "Essence of Wells". Visions of Wells Cathedral

## "Intimate Landscapes" – Tina Westcott

Tina is a local photographer who loves to explore with a geographer's eye, eager to discover what is around the next corner. #### Search & Learn project



This summer will see significant change on the first floor of the museum, made possible thanks to a grant from the National Lottery Heritage Fund and a bequest from the late Jean Imray. Our volunteer maintenance team have started to decorate the two gallery spaces which will house the new Wells City Galleries, ready for interpretation

## Library news

Since the last newsletter, we have seen in the Local Press photos of recent changes in the Library. The May issue of Wells Voice carried a picture of Library assistants at the Cathedral end of the room. Close to the right of the window is the Coleridge Archive with a portrait of Coleridge overhead. It may be coincidence, but recently an A-Level candidate from the Cathedral School has come to use a book on Coleridge from the Archive.

Since then, the Wells Journal for 18 May devoted half a page to a report, by Maxine Irving, featuring a picture of the Museum's famous albatross. This huge bird has been moved from its long-standing place in one of the Museum's galleries - now needed for a new exhibit. What the Library now has is a permanent exhibit incorporating the link between Captain Cook (who knew all about albatrosses), William Wales, the astronomer on the second of Cook's voyages to the southern seas and Coleridge's Rime of the Ancient Mariner. In his own account of the second voyage, Wales describes the white water-snakes seen from the ship. Coleridge, in his Rime of the Ancient Mariner, is quoted as follows:

'Beyond the shadow of the ship/I watched the water-snakes. They moved in track of shining white/And when they reared, the elfish light/Fell off in hoary flakes.'. The connection? When Wales returned from the second voyage, he became the mathematics master as Christ's Hospital when Coleridge was a boy there!

Not all the news is about Coleridge and Cook. The Wells Public Library has given us three titles that they are discarding. One we already have - Wells & Glastonbury: A Historical & Topographical Account - but it is so attractive that we have decided to shelve it as both Glastonbury and Wells. The other two are both from the second half of the 19th century. One lists the Somerset clergy of the Wells Archdeaconry from 1311 to the 1730s. The other is Architectural Antiquities of the City of Wells, dating from 1866. Its drawings are delightful. **Stuart Andrews, Hon Librarian**
