## Museum opening Monday 6 January with FREE admission for everyone until Easter!

Come and watch the staff and volunteers creating new exhibitions and displays in at least three of our rooms, Health & safety permitting! Over £7000 has been raised from the Wookey Hole Caves and the Sustainable Development Fund of the Mendip Hills Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty to redisplay the "Witch" of Wookey Hole and many of Herbert Balch's early prehistoric finds from the various caves of Ebbor Gorge and Wookey Hole valley. At the same time further funds have been raised to contribute to the national remembrance of the WW1 – **Wells Remembers 1914-18** opening in the summer and is being created in partnership with the Wells Blue School and the Cathedral School, and other organisations.

Finally, work has begun on a new room for the **History of Wells**, including Phillips City Photography Studio, Bob Fry railwayman and wartime St John Ambulance volunteer, Policing in Wells, and a display of fine 18<sup>th</sup> and 19<sup>th</sup> century English wine glasses and bottles, illustrating the way of life of the inhabitants of 8 Cathedral Green, the house that later became the museum in 1932.

# An exhibition of mid-20c photographs by Reece Winstone FRPS 6,000 photographs, 17 cameras, 4 decades, 2 counties, 1 freelance

By 1964 the late Reece Winstone FRPS had taken 38,000 photographs across 'Beautiful Britain' as a freelance photographer, of which some 6,000 were of Bristol and Somerset. In this exhibition and accompanying catalogue his son has selected 150 photographs of Vanishing Lives in the two counties, in town and country. Since the period 1930 to the mid-1960s life has changed immeasurably, for almost all, culturally and in expectations. It is this shift that this broad range of photographs illustrates; even the practice of photography has not been left untouched. As contributor Ian Sumner says – 'He became a consummate freelance photographer ... his way of working has all but disappeared today ... nobody will ever work like Reece again.'

Reece, best known for his many books on Bristol As It Was, showed Bristolians

their inheritance - what had come before their personal memories of the city -



and what had been lost. Reece's books gave birth to a new genre of published photography, to be adopted across the world.

The Reece Winstone Archive is delighted to be showing this travelling exhibition in Somerset following a very popular showing in Bristol. There will be a talk and exhibition tour by Reece's son, John, for the public at 2.30pm on Saturday 25 January. Admission free for both the exhibition and talk.

#### A new "Witch" of Wookey Hole



The Trustees are now moving forward with the next phase of updating the displays throughout the museum. The owners of Wookey Hole Caves have agreed to fund a large photo panorama of the first chamber of the cave with the "witch's" bones sensitively displayed. Other artefacts found with her will also be included. Over £7000 has been raised from the Wookey Hole Caves and the Sustainable Development Fund of the Mendip Hills Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty to redisplay the "Witch" of Wookey Hole and as well as many of Herbert Balch's early prehistoric finds from the various other caves of Ebbor Gorge and Wookey Hole

valley. Work will start in January 2014 and should be complete by Easter.

## **Bristol & Somerset: Vanishing Lives – NOW OPEN**

The social and historical photographic record, created by freelance photographer Reece Winstone, of the changes in cultural and social life from the 1930s to the 1960s is a unique and beautiful record of an important time of change and development in the 20th Century.

Reece Winstone took over 38,000 photographs of "Beautiful Britain" 6,000 of which were of Bristol and Somerset. These pictures document the "Vanishing Lives" in the two counties, in the town and in the country. Famous for his genre of books - *Bristol As It Was*, Reece Winstone took amazing photographs of the daily work and lives of the people of Bristol and Somerset. Reece's son, John Winstone, who lives in Wookey, has carefully selected photographs,

in black and white, which show wide-ranging subjects in historical context.




This collection is one that will never be repeated and captures a time, which, although not too far in the past, has disappeared forever. It is a nationally important archive that is now available to see.




### "The Lost Islands of Somerset" - exploring a unique wetland heritage

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#### **WELLS REMEMBERS**

Open from Saturday 9 August



To mark the start of the Centenary of the First World War, the Wells and Mendip Museum is opening the **Wells Remembers** First World War exhibition on Saturday 9 August. The exhibition, which is part of a four-year project, will evolve over this period to tell the story of the events of one hundred years ago. Visitors will experience the sights and sounds of the trenches, see and learn about curious and disturbing artefacts and discover the stories of individuals from Wells and the surrounding villages, with displays covering the home front and the fighting fronts.

The exhibition will draw on the City Archives, the museum's collections of images and artifacts and a wide range of objects which have been generously lent to the Wells

Remembers Project, including the Knight Collection – a fascinating collection of weapons, uniforms and equipment. The Project is a partnership between the Wells and Mendip Museum, City Archives, Blue School, Wells Cathedral School, Cathedral, Bishop's Palace, Wells Journal, City Council and the Royal British Legion and has been supported by a grant from the Heritage Lottery Fund and a matching contribution from local donors.

Martin Grass, the Chairman of the Wells and Mendip Museum said "We are very excited to be opening this exhibition, which has been created by volunteers and a genuine community partnership. The stories being told are fascinating, engaging and moving – and more stories are emerging each week from the research being carried out and through members of the community coming forward with letters and memories. We want people to get involved – not just by visiting the exhibition but by attending events and sharing their families' experiences."

The Project includes a second exhibition at the Wells Town Hall, opening later in the summer, and a programme of events listed on the website **www.wellsremembers.com** - which has been designed by a Wells sixth-former and will be expanded by other school pupils. The City's commemoration will commence with the service at Wells Cathedral and acts of dedication and remembrance on the evening of 4 August.

#### **Art Exhibition by ROBIN GRAY**

Monday 4 August to Friday 29 August – Free Entry As Chairman of the International Society for Spelaeological Art and a keen caver, Robin Gray's interest in natural history, geology and fossils greatly influenced his work and he soon became known as a creator of "organics and abstracts". He is best known for his realistic paintings of the Mendip caves. This abstract art exhibition may come as a surprise to local collectors who think they know his work.




#### **WELLS ART CONTEMPORARY Exhibition**

Entries will be in every possible media, and this year includes entries by students from Wells Blue School, Wells Cathedral School, Millfield School and Strode College.



#### **GEOPHYSICS ON CATHEDRAL GREEN**

Members of CHERT (the Charterhouse Environs Research Team) and Museum volunteers spent 3 warm days in July on the Green undertaking a Resistivity survey. Members of the public bravely joined in, as part of the Mendip Hills Festival of Archaeology.



The survey instrument measured ground resistance, which is higher where there are stones and lower where there is deep soil. In the plot above higher readings are in the lighter tones. The large dark area on the south west side is likely to be dumped soil put there when the Green was levelled, and the lighter spots in it are pits for trees and drainage soakaways put in in 2009. Other patterns suggest paths and buildings. Interpretation of the rest will take more research and time. A full report will be published in due course.
